FINAL ORDER

On September 12, 2019, the District of Columbia Court of Appeals issued an order indefinitely suspending Larry C. Williams's license to practice of law on the basis of disability. *See In Re: Larry C. Williams*, No. 19-BS-760 (D.C. 2019). Mr. Williams did not report to this Court this suspension as required by Rule 83.2(e) of the Rules of the United States Court of Federal Claims ("RCFC"). The Court learned of Mr. Williams's suspension on September 16, 2019.

Mr. Williams has been a member of this Court's bar since July 12, 1990 and has no pending cases. Under RCFC 83.2(c)(2), an attorney may be disciplined on the grounds of an act, omission, or impairment that results in the disbarment or suspension of the attorney by another court. In addition, under RCFC 83.2(c)(4), an attorney may be disciplined on the grounds of failure to comply with the terms of RCFC 83.2, including failure to notify the Court in accordance with RCFC 83.2(e).

On October 5, 2020, the Court issued an order directing Mr. Williams to show cause within 30 days why he should not be suspended from the practice of law before the United States Court of Federal Claims. ECF No. 2. The Order to Show Cause further stated that if no response was received, Mr. Williams would be suspended from practice. *Id.* To date, Mr. Williams has not responded to the Order to Show Cause. Therefore,

IT IS ORDERED that Larry C. Williams shall be indefinitely suspended from the practice of law before the United States Court of Federal Claims, *nunc pro tunc*, September 16, 2019, the date this Court received notice of his suspension in the District of Columbia. The filing of any petition for reinstatement will be governed by RCFC 83.2(k)(1).
