FINAL ORDER

On May 24, 2021, the California Supreme Court entered an order revoking William Stocker's probation and suspending him from the practice of law for a minimum of two years. *In re William Stocker on Discipline*, SBC-20-PM-30751. Pursuant to the terms of the suspension order, Mr. Stocker "will remain suspended until [he] provides proof ... of rehabilitation, fitness to practice and present learning and ability in the general law." *Id*.

Mr. Stocker has been a member of this Court's bar since May 29, 1974 and has no pending cases. Under Rule 83.2(c)(2) of the Rules of the United States Court of Federal Claims ("RCFC"), an attorney admitted to practice before this Court may be disciplined for an act or omission that results in the attorney's disbarment or suspension by another court. In addition, under Rule 83.2(c)(4), an attorney may be disciplined on the grounds of failure to comply with the terms of Rule 83.2, including failure to timely notify the Court in accordance with Rule 83.2(e).

On January 12, 2022, the Court issued an order directing Mr. Stocker to show cause within thirty (30) days why he should not be suspended from the practice of law before the United States Court of Federal Claims. ECF No. 4. The Order to Show Cause further stated that if no response was received, Mr. Stocker would be indefinitely suspended from practice before the Court. *Id.* To date, Mr. Stocker has not responded to the Order to Show Cause. Therefore,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that William Stocker shall be indefinitely suspended from the practice of law before the United States Court of Federal Claims effective, *nunc pro tunc*, May 24, 2021, the date of his suspension in California. The filing of any petition for reinstatement will be governed by RCFC 83.2(k)(1).
