DECISION DISMISSING PETITION AND AWARDING ATTORNEYS' FEES AND COSTS ¹

On March 14, 2008, petitioners filed a Petition for Vaccine Compensation in the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program ("the Program"),² alleging that Andrew

was injured by a vaccine or vaccines listed on the Vaccine Injury Table. See § 14. The information in the record does not show entitlement to an award under the Program.

On October 19, 2011, the petitioners moved for a decision on the merits of the petition, acknowledging that insufficient evidence exists to demonstrate entitlement to compensation.

To receive compensation under the Program, petitioners must prove either 1) that Andrew suffered a “Table Injury” – i.e., an injury falling within the Vaccine Injury Table – corresponding to one of Andrew’s vaccinations, or 2) that Andrew suffered an injury that was actually caused by a vaccine. See §§ 13(a)(1)(A) and 11(c)(1). Examination of the record does not disclose any evidence that Andrew suffered a “Table Injury.” Further, the record does not contain a medical expert’s opinion or any other persuasive evidence indicating that Andrew’s alleged injury was vaccine-caused.

Under the Vaccine Act, a petitioner may not be awarded compensation based on the petitioner’s claims alone. Rather, the petition must be supported by either the medical records or by a medical opinion. § 13 (a)(1). In this case, the record does not contain medical records or a medical opinion sufficient to demonstrate that the vaccinee was injured by a vaccine. For these reasons, in accordance with § 12(d)(3)(A), the **petitioners’ claim for compensation is denied and this case is dismissed for insufficient proof.**

The petitioners have also filed an unopposed motion for an award of attorneys’ fees and costs in this case. Petitioners are entitled to reasonable attorneys’ fees and costs pursuant to §§ 15(b) and (e)(1). Respondent has reviewed the motion and does not object. §§ 13(a)(1)(A) and 11(c)(1). In lieu of filing a General Order # 9 statement, petitioners’ counsel noted the out of pocket costs that petitioners personally incurred.

The request for attorneys’ fees and costs is granted. Petitioners are awarded reasonable attorneys’ fees and costs pursuant to §§ 15(b) and (e)(1), as I find that the petition was brought in good faith and upon a reasonable basis, and the amounts requested are reasonable and appropriate.

Accordingly, I hereby award the **total of \$7,088.84**. This total represents \$250.00 in petitioners’ personal costs, and \$6,838.84 in attorney fees and costs. The payment shall be:

- 1. a lump sum of \$6,838.84, in the form of a check payable jointly to petitioners, and petitioners’ counsel, Gallagher and Gallagher Law Firm LLC, for attorney fees and costs; and**
- 2. a lump sum of \$250.00, in the form of a check payable to petitioners, for out-of-pocket expenses personally incurred by petitioners.**

“Vaccine Act” or “the Act”). Hereafter, individual section references will be to 42 U.S.C. § 300aa of the Act.

In the absence of a timely-filed motion for review filed pursuant to Appendix B of the Rules of the U.S. Court of Federal Claims, the clerk of the court shall enter judgment in accordance herewith.³
