DECISION¹

LORD, Special Master.

On September 20, 2011, the parties in the above-captioned case filed a Stipulation memorializing their agreement as to the appropriate amount of compensation in this case. Petitioner, Stewart Clay, Jr., alleged that he suffered the onset of Guillain Barre Syndrome ("GBS") that was caused-in-fact by the influenza vaccine that he received on September 29, 2009, which vaccine is contained in the Vaccine Injury Table, 42 C.F.R § 100.3(a). Mr. Clay further alleges that he experienced the residual effects of his injury for more than six months. Mr. Clay seeks compensation related to this injury pursuant to the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program, 42 U.S.C. §300aa-10 to 34.

Respondent denies that the influenza vaccine caused Mr. Clay's GBS, and denies that Mr. Clay experienced the residual effects of any vaccine-related injury for more than six months. Nonetheless, the parties have agreed informally to resolve this matter.

The court hereby ADOPTS the parties' said Stipulation, attached hereto as Appendix A, and awards compensation in the amount and on the terms set forth therein. Specifically, Petitioner is awarded:

¹ As provided by Vaccine Rule 18(b), each party has 14 days within which to request the redaction "of any information furnished by that party (1) that is trade secret or commercial or financial in substance and is privileged or confidential; or (2) that includes medical files or similar files, the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of privacy." Rules of the United States Court of Federal Claims (RCFC), Appendix B, Vaccine Rule 18(b). In the absence of a timely objection, the entire document will be made publicly available.

A lump sum of \$185,000.00, in the form of a check payable to Petitioner, which amount represents compensation for all damages that would be available under 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(a).

The court thanks the parties for their cooperative efforts in resolving this matter. In the absence of a motion for review filed pursuant to RCFC, Appendix B, the Clerk is directed to enter judgment accordingly.²

IT IS SO ORDERED.
