Vaccine Act Attorneys' Fees

DECISION (ATTORNEYS' FEES)

HASTINGS, Special Master.

On November 17, 2006, the petitioner submitted an application seeking an award for fees and costs incurred in this case filed under the National Vaccine Injury Compensation Program. The motion seeks a total of \$ 9,105.86. Respondent did not file an objection.

The total figure of \$ 9,105.86 seems reasonable and appropriate. Accordingly, I hereby award the following attorneys' fees and costs pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 300aa-15(b) and (e)(1):

A lump sum of \$ 9,105.86, in the form of a check payable jointly to petitioner and petitioner's counsel, Curtis R. Webb.

In the absence of a timely-filed motion for review of this Decision (see Appendix B, Rules of the United States Court of Federal Claims), the clerk shall enter judgment in accordance herewith.
